Landulph Parish Council Meeting, 20 April 26

Public Forum

The Parish Tree Warden expressed her astonishment at Cornwall Council's rushed proposal to reintroduce glyphosate for weedkilling on pavements/footpaths. See agenda item below. The proposal conflicts with the statutory requirement to promote nature recovery, and glyphosate is probably carcinogenic. Mr Richards is licenced to use chemical herbicides ('licenced to kill') but understood that glyphosate becomes inert when in contact with soil. (Technically becomes 'unavailable' – only breaks down 7-60 days, and persists on non-soil surfaces.)

Minutes – Matters Arising

Emergency Advice leaflet will now be published.

The CRCC had provided advice on the ownership of the Memorial Hall that was of no help. It suggested that it was common practice for parish councils to be custodian trustees.

Planning.

Electrical substation, Elbridge; Details updated, no comment required. However, there is still no proposed speed restriction from the A388, and sprays may be used to control weeds in planted areas - a hot topic!

Planning updates;

5 Hodders Way – pollarding TPO'd oak; Approved, but do planners ever listen to PC comments?

Lane End Cottage, Penyoke. Demolish a wall, natural stone replacement. No objection from PC (delegated decision).

Payments List.

The output from the new Scribe accounting package was displayed.

Councillors suggested improvements.

Public Realm Improvement & Re-introduction of Weed Treatment.

See Public Forum comments. There is enormous disquiet and comment about this. The proposals are unclear and appallingly timed - too late for the current precept round. Cornwall Council meet tomorrow (21 Apr) with a cross-party motion submitted asking for reconsideration. However, there are political implications so who knows what will happen. A letter requesting reconsideration has been submitted by 4 cross-party MPs, fronted by Anna Gelderd (our local MP). Redruth Town Council have a similar petition. The PC agreed to respond (TODAY!) saying they support the MP's letter and Redruth's petition, and will keep the matter under review until they have more information.

Memorial Hall.

Bringing the gas cooker up to regulations is too expensive. However, since the addition of battery backup, an electrical cooker was viable – particularly if a generator is added later. Cooker will be ceramic, not induction - the latter can affect chefs' pacemakers. The PC discussed whether an electrical cooker was actually a resilience measure. Two votes were taken; Resilience measure - PC fund cooker; 2 for, 2 against, 2 ab-

stentions (1 member absent). Not resilience - PC don't fund cooker; 3 for, 2 against, 1 abstention. Carried.

Slipway Panel

Proposed information panel for Sammy Sands was shown. The 'You are here' arrow is in slightly the wrong position, but otherwise it looks great and is free.

Governance & Finance Working Group

The new accounting package, 'Scribe', and the previous spreadsheet are aligned and will run in parallel for a while. General Reserve 63%, more than last year but this reflects timing of FIPL grants. £5K net underspend on budget, largely as no clerk was employed for a while. Finances are deemed to be healthy...but not too much!

Landulph Climate Group

Bio-Watch is being promoted. This is an extension of an initiative in Saltash (SEA).

Landulph Orchard Group

Pursuing an accessibility grant.

Playing Field Working Group

New fencing ordered but not yet paid for as it is slightly delayed.

Estimate for tractor refurbishment is £645. Whilst this seems a lot, it is 9 years since the last overhaul. The tractor is seen as iconic.

PC approved repair, but will budget for a future replacement.

Searle Family Memorial Field

Nothing heard from the cricket or rugby groups. The electricity meter has been removed, but needs National Grid to come and make safe.

AOB

Councillor Tagg has acquired photos from the Millenium project and will upload them to the community website. Apparently, there is a copy on CD in the Memorial Hall time capsule.

Mr Richards pointed out that the Asset Register shows current values, but unless these have been updated in the last few years they may not be accepted in the event of an insurance claim. Values should also include disposal costs.

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Annual Parish Assembly – a year in review

This rather odd meeting, which is part of official local government but not actually a Parish Council meeting, was held on 11 May. It preceded the Parish Annual Meeting (see below) just to make things more opaque. Its main purpose is for the Parish Council to give a report of its doings over the past year to the General Public and for the GP to pass comment (or judgement). This year the Parish Council took the unusual step of inviting all the local groups, clubs and associations to give a short talk on their activities for the information of the wide public. The wider public, however, was not in attendance.

The council and other club and association members heard about the activities of the new Art Club, the well-established Cargreen Yacht Club, The Landulph Festival of Music and the Arts, including the programme for the 2026 Fest, The Gardening Club, Landulph Parish Church, Landulph.org, the relatively new Community Website – Landulph.org, the Film Club, Mah Jongg Group, Tai Chi Group and The Newsletter Group. Full details of all these excellent bodies are on www.Landulph.org.

The meeting also heard a report from our new local County Councillor, Paul Cador who explained his role and how he disposed of the £1,400 local community chest over which he has control. Beneficiaries included: Saltash Veterans, The Cornwall International Male Choral Festival, the Sir Robert Geffery School and Cornwall Blood Bikes.

Parish Chairman, Martin Worth, outlined the achievements of the Council over the past year and highlighted the new speed limits, the bus service and development of Duke Orchard and Duchess Green for which he congratulated Cllr Clare Tagg.

He spoke of the new tech being adopted by the Parish and the move from spreadsheets to online accounting. For the future the priorities of the Council would be housing, transport - including use of the River Tamar, repurposing Searle Family cricket field and electricity infrastructure at Elbridge. One of the big issues facing the Parish was the phasing out of the old Neighbourhood Plan and replacing it with a Neighbourhood Priorities Statement. He said the Council would be working closely with St Mellion whose Statement was already well under way.

He announced that planning permission had recently been given to the provision of a new classroom at Landulph School which will house the Landulph Under 5s. This will free up the Memorial Hall where safeguarding issues have proved restrictive on some activities. The future of the Hall needed to be addressed, he said, but there were issues about its ownership which needed to be resolved.

Parish Council – May

This was the Annual Meeting of the Landulph Parish Council, not to be confused with the Annual Parish Assembly (see above).

The first job of the meeting, and the only thing to distinguish it from ordinary meetings was that the officers had to be re-elected. Martin Worth was asked to serve his 10th year as Chair with Libby Gawith as Vice-Chair.

Weed control This issue had caused controversy at a recent County Council Meeting when it was proposed to reintroduce glyphosate treatment of weeds on paths, pavements and verges. It was also discussed at length at their last Parish Council meeting (see above). The County has delayed a decision but, as Clare Tagg observed, while the Council consults, the weeds grow. The Parish Council is investigating the practicality of running a volunteer local weed reduction campaign in conjunction with the County's contractor, Cormac. Cormac could provide PPE and tools. The Landulph Footpaths Group is already registered with Cormac as a responsible body and might be able to do the work. Cllr Worth cautioned that any action by parishioners might have financial and safety consequences. No decision was taken.

Hedge Cutting The battle against the fecundity of nature was rejoined in the discussion about when and if to cut the hedges along parish roads and, particularly, over Highdown. It was reported that it was unlikely the County would pay for the cut. However, it was proposed to repeat the procedure of last year whereby a request was made to the County to cut the hedges. When this was refused the Parish could declare the road over Highdown to be unsafe and then pay for a local contractor to do the work. Cllr Worth observed that such action was strictly beyond the Parish's remit but was the only way forward. He added that, traditionally the cut was not undertaken until after Wimbledon!

There being nothing further for the Parish to destroy the meeting closed.

We will keep you informed of all the ongoing developments.

Under Fives

Our topic for the first half of the Summer term is 'Growing & Mini Beasts'. The children have been learning about the sequencing of planting a Sunflower and have planted their very own. The children will be looking after them and seeing how they grow. The children have been studying mini beasts closely using magnifying glasses and learning about parts of their bodies. The children are enjoying our Farm Shop role play area where they are creating shopping lists, going shopping and being the shop keeper. We have also created hand print butterflies and counted bugs into a jar for a maths activity.

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Counting the Trees

Over 350 trees have been planted by volunteers in Landulph Orchard Green over the last 2 years. We have examined and catalogued all the trees.



Of the 60 container grown fruit trees planted in Duke Orchard in spring 2024, most produced blossom and fruit last year and only two have died. These trees are local varieties of apple, pear, plum, damson, cherry and cobnuts. We recently removed the deer guards from these trees to make it easier to reach the fruit and allow space for the tree to grow. In Duke Orchard we have since planted crab apples around the entrance arch, a memorial tree for John and Leslie Hall and a willow dome. The fruit trees are numbered and we are producing a map and index showing the varieties

A year later in spring 2025, in a very



muddy Duchess Green, a willow arch and 30 fruit trees were planted with some help from Glyn Deacon and his digger. As well as local varieties of apples and cherries, these included rather more unusual (but still locally grown) fruit trees including almonds, a medlar, greengage, fig and drooping plums. Of these, two have died this year and two donated ornamental cherries were planted. It will be interesting to see how much fruit these trees produce (the medlar and almond fruited last year) and which attract the most wildlife.

The Miyawaki forest was designed by Landulph School and 256 small whips with a plug of soil were planted in November 2024 in 70 one



metre squares with three to five trees per square. In urban settings, the dense planting is reported to create a thriving woodland much more quickly than conventional planting – we are interested to see whether this is true in a Cornish field. So far, only 15 trees have died and over 50 have at least doubled in height despite enduring a long dry spell

last summer and a very wet spring. We planted 16 locally grown native varieties; so far the alder and hawthorn are doing the best – none have died and the largest alder has grown from about 30cm to 120cm. The elder and holly are both growing much more slowly and 5 of the goat willows have died.



Thank you to everyone who has helped with planting, weeding, mulching, watering and wassailing. With continued support, these trees will grow into a lasting asset for the parish and a legacy for future generations.

Life Saving Automatic Defibrillators

There are two defibrillators located within our parish, both for public use in an emergency.

1. Landulph Memorial Hall in Fore Street
2. Cargreen Yacht Club, Coombe Lane.

Landulph Memorial Hall defibrillator:

Located adjacent to front doors

To use you are required to input the code 1111 to unlock, and press the green 'tick' button to open for access.

Cargreen Yacht Club defibrillator

Located on the front wall of the building before you reach the front doors.

This unit is left unlocked, and so no unlock code is required.

Please remember in the event that you may need to use one of the above units, that in a cardiac arrest situation: **continuous CPR is essential while someone else goes to obtain the defibrillator.**
